 Information: The majority of this books content is new information about (1:1). 		
 Instruction: Instruction about future judgments should motivate 		
(1:3).		
 Warning: "The time is at hand" (1:3). 		
Revelation was <i>not</i> written for		
 Revelation does give a lot of new information about the end of the world. 		
 Some of this information is obscured through the use of apocalyptic 		
 Forcing symbols to match current events to satisfy personal curiosity will likely result in mistaken conclusions. 		
Author: The apostle • He wrote a (1:2).

 He ministered in the churches of Asia Minor at the end of his life making the beginning 		
comments addressed to these churches appropriate.		
Church fathers testified to his authorship.		
Recipient: The recipients of Revelation are divided into three groups.		
• Recipients defined by: the seven churches in Asia (1:4).		
• Recipients defined by: the angels of the seven churches (2:1, etc.)		
Recipients defined by time: from the Church Age and beyond		
Date: Late 1 st century, AD		
This was the book written (22:18).		
Church fathers like Irenaeus claimed it was written before the end of Emperor		
Domitian's reign (AD 96).		
Probably around AD		
Key Theme: The "Apocalypse of Jesus Christ" (1:1) shows the primary theme: Jesus Christ is		
revealed as the King and Judge of the world.		
Apocalypse in Greek means "" (1:1).
